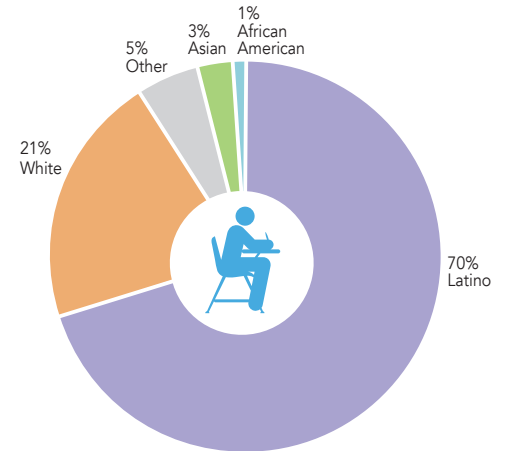




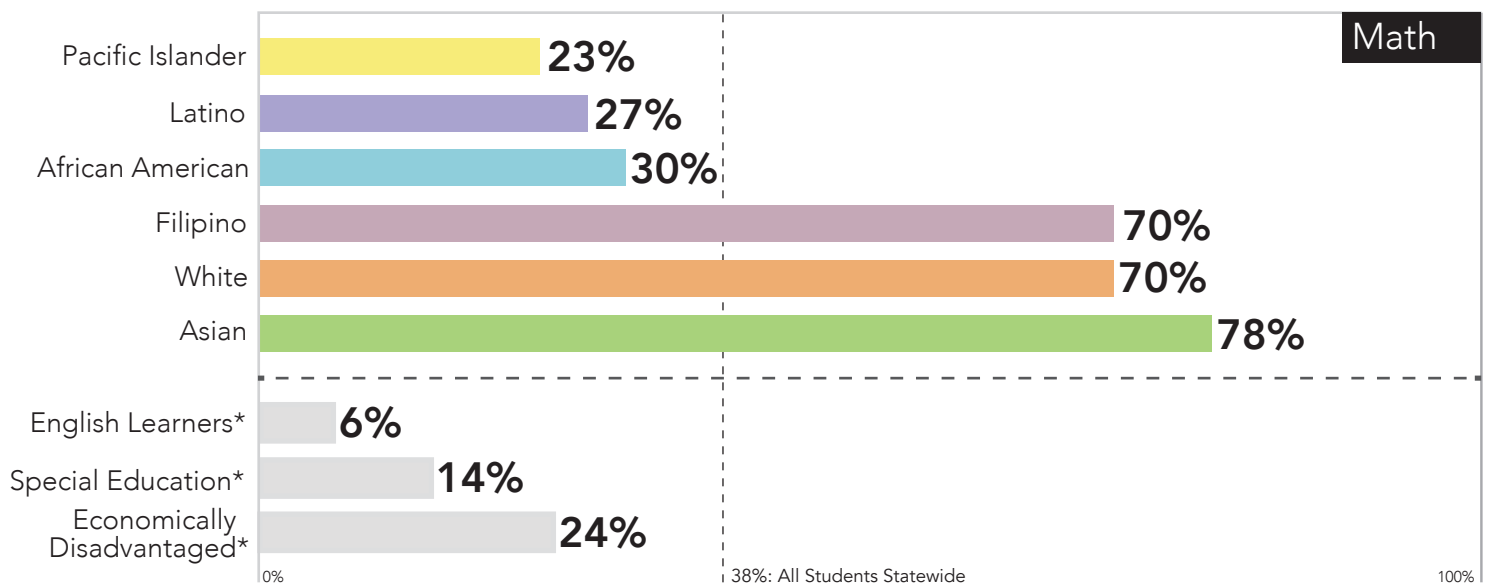
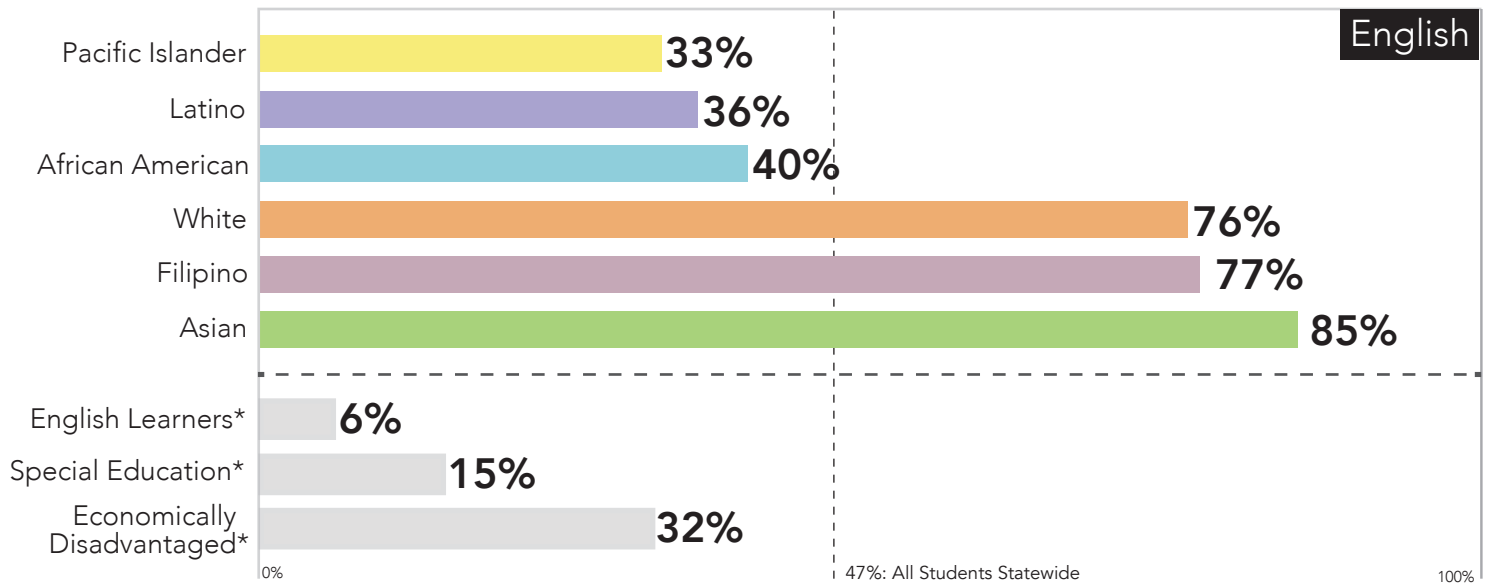
District Student Spotlight

This fact sheet shows how students are performing in Redwood City School District (RCSD) in English and math for different student groups. RCSD enrolled 7,950 students in 2016-17. The majority of students - 5,500 - are Latino.

White, Asian and Filipino students in RCSD are scoring well above the state average on standardized tests. However, the district is falling short in serving other student groups. The vast majority of Latino, African American and Pacific Islander students in the district are not at grade level.



Students Meeting or Exceeding Standards

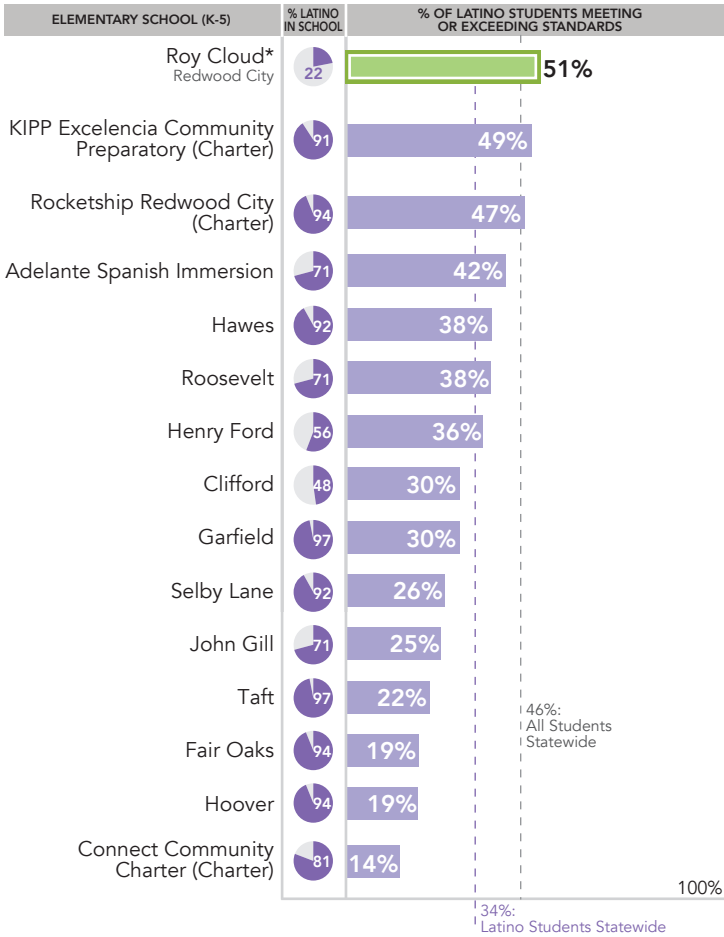

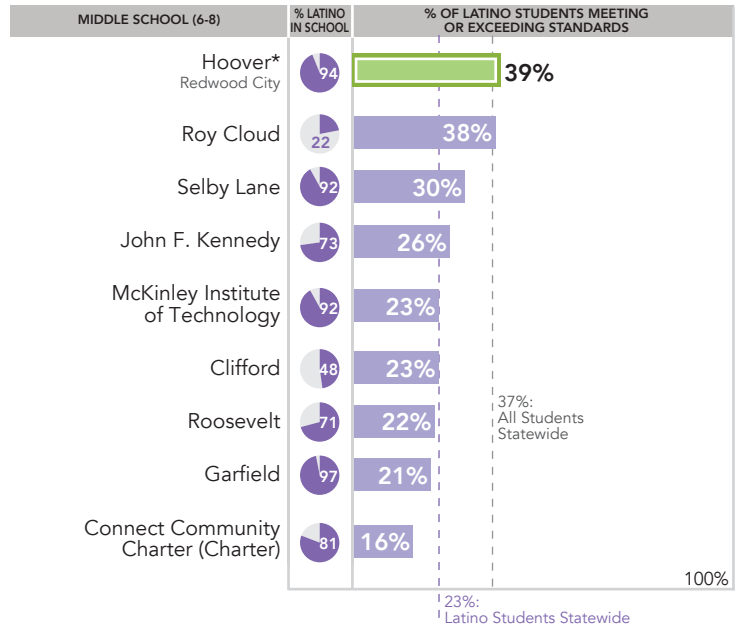
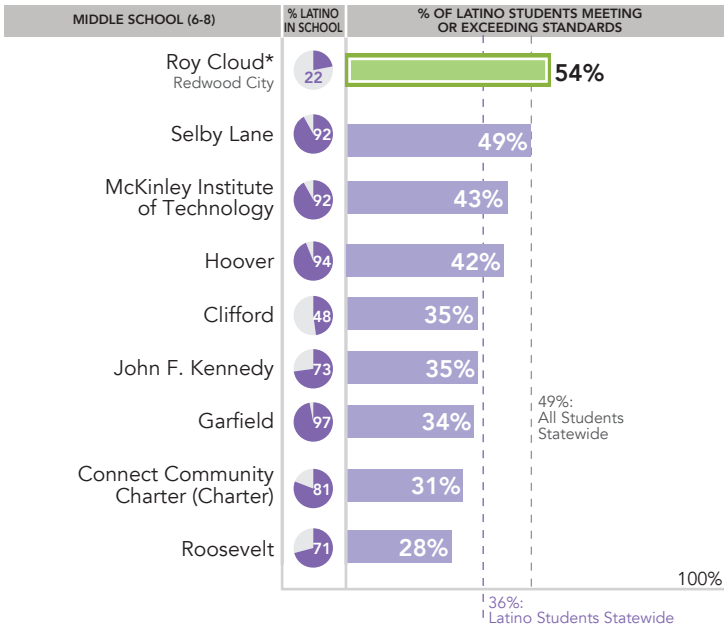
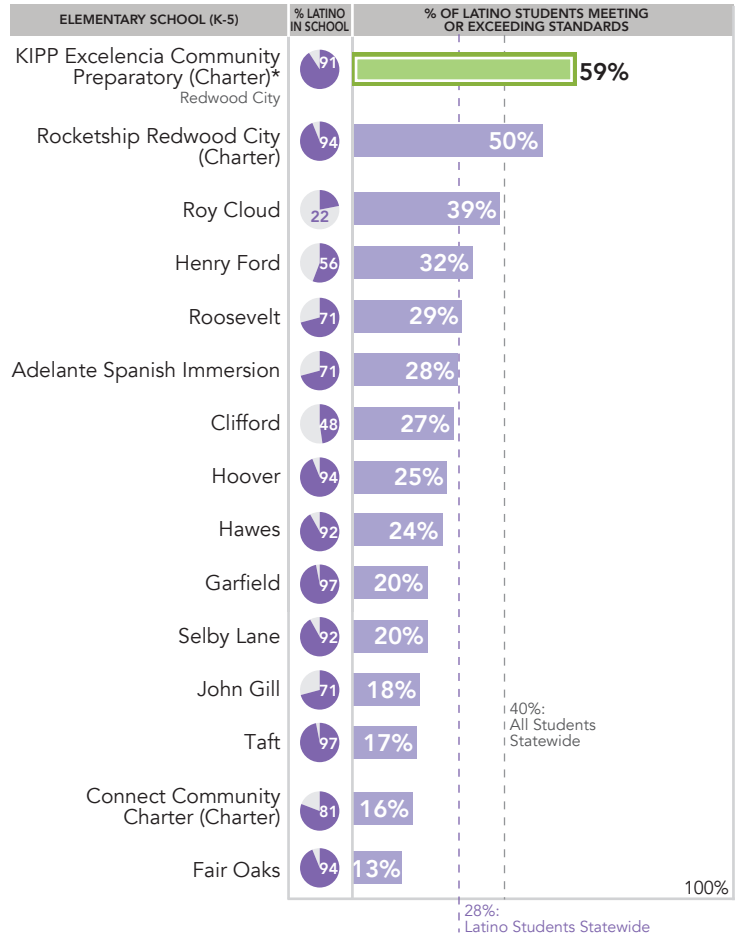
